

Message from the Rabbi –February 2014

Last month I wrote about my colleague, Rabbi Phyllis Somers' blog, "Superman Sam," which chronicles the last 18 months of the life of her young son who died on December 14 of Acute Myeloid Leukemia at the age of 8. When we were together at our January service, I was touched at how many of you came up to me at the oneg to talk about it. There is something singularly tragic and awful about the death of a young child, of course. In the face of such a terrible event, most people want to be helpful; certainly, few intend to cause hurt. Since young Sam Somers' death, there's been some impassioned conversation on one of my rabbinic list serves about some of the things one should – and should never - say to a mourner. Since all of us come into contact with people who are grieving, I hope that you'll tuck these pieces of wisdom away somewhere for a time when you might use them. Typical comments appear first on each line followed by responses often felt, although not said aloud, by the mourner. Feel free to share with others as well.

Well-meaning but just plain wrong. (And here's why)

1."God needed [your loved one] so He took him/her." ("Do you know that for sure? Anyway, I'd rather have my husband here with me than with God, thank you very much, and I'm quite sure that he would agree.")

- 2. "Be grateful that she's no longer suffering." ("My mother's suffering was terribly painful to witness, but the end to her suffering doesn't in any way diminish how much I miss her.")
- 3. "He's in a better place now." (See #1 above.)
- 4."At least, you still have your mother." ("Each of my parents was absolutely unique and so is my relationship with each one. I love my mother and am grateful she is here, but she doesn't substitute for my father.")
- 5. "At least, you still have your other children." (See #4 above.)
- 6. "You're still young enough to meet someone else." ("But there were so many things we never got to share together!")
- 7. "You're so lucky that you had her for so many years." ("I'm too old to meet someone else now.")
- 8. "Everybody loses their parents eventually. This is part of the natural order of things." ("Of course I know that, but I wanted him in my life forever.")
- 9. "Just give me a call if you need anything."
 ("When I get up in the morning, I barely know what day it is, I have trouble getting dressed, and I can't seem to remember anything that happened more than five minutes ago. Figuring out what I might need on any given day, finding your phone number and then having the energy to pick up the phone is

way more than I can possibly imagine doing at this time in my life.")

- 10. "You just need to get closure." ("I don't want to ever forget him. There is nothing that I want to 'close.'")
- 11. "God has a purpose for everything even when we don't know what it is." ("Can you explain that purpose to me?")

Better (And here's why.)

- 1. "I am so sorry for your loss." ("I feel that you're with me and that comforts me.")
- 2. "May I bring you dinner tomorrow?" ("That would be so helpful. I wouldn't eat otherwise.")
- 3. "I am going to the supermarket now. Can I pick up some items for you?" OR "I see you're low on paper goods. Can I restock them for you?" ("You saw what I needed. Thank you.")
- 4. "There's snow forecast for tomorrow. Can I send over my teenager to clear your driveway?" ("I have no idea where a shovel is. That would be so helpful.")
- 5. "I see you have a lot of thank-you notes here next to all the condolence cards you've received. Can I help you address them/get you stamps/take them to the post office?" (See #3 above.)
- 6. "Next Tuesday I was planning to go to a lecture at the library. Can I pick you up?" ("I'm so worried about being alone when shiva's over. Thank you.")

I'm sure that you can add your own examples to this list.

Why are Mezuzot hung diagonal?



One of the most famous French rabbis of the twelfth century was Rabbi Solomon ben Isaac, also known as Rashi. His grandson, Rabbenu Tam, felt that *mezuzot* should be affixed horizontally for the sake of tradition, because the scrolls in their leather cases were originally pushed horizontally into the crevices between the stones around the doorways of homes. Rashi argued that *mezuzot* should be affixed vertically, in such a way that the top pointed toward the Almighty. They eventually compromised, and agreed that a *mezuzah* should be hung on the diagonal, with its top inclined toward the inside.
