



Message from the Rabbi February, 2013

“We’re a warm and welcoming congregation!” How many times have you heard that phrase used by a congregation to describe itself? Don’t get me wrong; it’s an admirable goal. But it falls short of the mark far too often. Several years ago, over the course of a several month period, a “stealth” group of lay leaders from the Union for Reform Judaism visited congregations all over the country on Friday evenings. Arriving unannounced, they almost always found themselves ignored. No one greeted them when they entered the building. They sat alone in the sanctuary and, more often than not, stood by themselves at the oneg. Their widely-reported experiences were sobering to those who care about creating synagogue communities that are, in fact, truly welcoming. One of those visitors later said, “I did it frequently enough that I knew within *15 seconds of walking into the building* if anyone there would talk to me that night. If I hadn’t been ‘on a mission’ I would have walked right out.”

This past Friday evening was our annual Tu b’Svat Seder. Told in advance that we might have some new faces there, I was on the lookout. Sure enough, before the dinner began I was introduced to a lovely woman who was with us for the first time. We chatted for awhile. As much as I was enjoying the conversation, after a few minutes I needed to excuse myself to confer with Philip about music for the Seder. I spotted a table where some of our members had already settled themselves. Steering the woman to that table, I made introductions, went off to find Philip, and hoped for the best. I needn’t have been concerned. When I looked back about 20 minutes later, the entire table – the four “regulars” plus our visitor – were engaged in a spirited discussion. We may be small in number and limited in resources, but in our congregation, “warm and welcoming” is the real deal.

Why does “warm and welcoming” so often fail? Why are synagogue visitors too often left to fend for themselves? Some of us are genuinely shy; it’s not so easy for us to start a conversation with a stranger. And we all like to catch up with our own friends. Still, think about a time when you were new somewhere - unsure or alone. Did someone reach out to you? Do you remember how grateful you were? Imagine what might be behind the timid smile of the first-time visitor – the pain of a recent loss, the insecurity of having just moved to a new community, the hope of finding new friends. What else just might be waiting there for an opportunity to emerge? A great sense of humor, an understanding ear, an intuitive mind, compassion, enthusiasm, energy? There is a period of *15 seconds* to find out, 15 seconds in which a stranger may either join the mosaic of our

community – or, walk out the door and never come back. In these moments, each and every member of the congregation is a *malach* – an angel, a messenger of God. *Melachim* – angels – change lives. From Rabbi Lawrence Kushner, we learn: “And so we understand that ordinary people are messengers of the Most High. They go about their tasks in holy anonymity, often, even unknown to themselves. Yet, if they had not been there, if they had not said what they said or did what they did, it would not be the way it is now. We would not be the way we are now. Never forget that you, too, yourself may be a messenger. Perhaps even one whose errand extends over several lifetimes.”

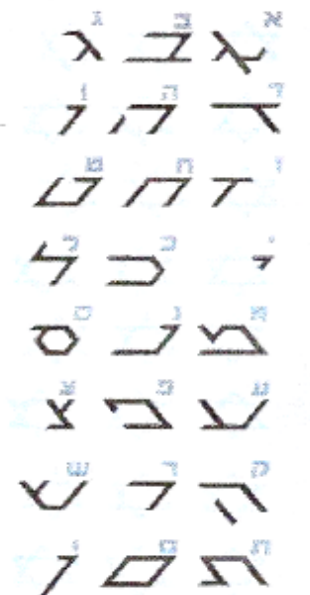
PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

“Reflections On My Life As A Rabbi”



Rabbi Sally J. Priesand, America's first female rabbi, was ordained in June, 1972, by Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati, Ohio. From 1981-2006, she served as Rabbi of Monmouth Reform Temple, becoming Rabbi Emerita upon her retirement.

Nationally, she has served on the Executive Board of both the Central Conference of American Rabbis and the Union for Reform Judaism. She also served as a member of the Board of Governors of HUC-JIR, as President of the Rabbinic Alumni Association, and for three years as editor of the CCAR

Newsletter. In 2007, she invited her female rabbinic colleagues of all denominations to join her in donating their professional and personal papers to the American Jewish Archives in Cincinnati, Ohio, in order to document the history of women in the rabbinate.

Locally, she is an Honorary Vice President of the Jewish Federation of Greater Monmouth County and President of Interfaith Neighbors. She chairs the membership committee of the Center for Holocaust, Human Rights and Genocide Education (CHHANGE) at Brookdale Community College, is an active supporter of the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County and works closely with Planned Parenthood on both the local and national level. .

She is the recipient of many awards and honors. The most recent include receiving, in 2009, the Elizabeth Blackwell Award from Hobart and William Smith Colleges and the Distinguished Alumni Award from the McMicken College of Arts and Sciences at the University of Cincinnati. In 2010, in honor of its 125th anniversary, GOOD HOUSEKEEPING MAGAZINE named her one of 125 women who changed our lives and our world.

Rabbi Priesand, a native of Cleveland, Ohio, lives in Ocean Township, New Jersey, together with her Boston Terrier, Shadow.

Yet how can they celebrate when almost every day brings news of another relative or friend murdered in the Holocaust? Their struggle to rebuild their lives is further threatened by growing anti-Semitism in London's streets; Englishmen want to take homes and jobs from Jewish refugees and give them to returning servicemen.

Edith's father is believed to have survived, and finding him rests on Georg's shoulders. Then Georg learns of a plot by Palestinian Jews to assassinate Britain's foreign minister. Georg must try to stop the murder, all the while navigating a city that wants to "eject the aliens."

In The List, Fletcher investigates an ignored and painful chapter in London's history. The novel is both a breathless thriller of postwar sabotage and a heartrending and historically accurate portrait of an almost forgotten era. In this sensitive, deeply touching, and impossible-to-forget story, Martin Fletcher explores the themes of hope, prejudice, loss and love that make up the lives of all refugees everywhere.”

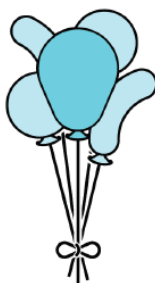
