Message

Message From the Rabbi:

Several years ago a woman I know (I'll call her Barbara) lost her husband suddenly and unexpectedly. There was the usual whirl of the funeral and period of shiva. During shiva, Barbara's house was full of people. I also saw many cards and letters arrive as well as more food than anyone could ever do anything with. A few weeks after the conclusion of shiva, Barbara and I had lunch, and the name of a mutual acquaintance of ours came up. Barbara expressed pain, hurt, and anger that this person had neither come to the funeral nor paid a shiva call. I was surprised and I said to Barbara, "Can you really remember who was there and who wasn't? Wasn't it all just a jumble for you?" Barbara looked me straight in the eye and said, "I know who came. I know who called. I know who sent a card. I remember everything."

That was a real eye-opener for me and I will always be grateful to Barbara for teaching me a lesson I have never forgotten. Previously, like many of you, I'm sure, I had sometimes passed on a shiva call or failed to otherwise acknowledge the death of someone I hadn't known very well like a neighbor or a rather removed acquaintance. You know those cases. You're busy. Your life is full. You tell yourself, "I didn't really know them. I'm not important to their family. They won't notice or care if I come or I don't." Well, maybe they would and maybe they wouldn't. Maybe Barbara was more sensitive than most of other people. I don't know. But as for me, all I can say is, ever since that defining moment over lunch with Barbara, I try to err on the side of doing more rather than less. I figure it couldn't hurt.

Jewish law, custom, and tradition have a great deal to say about how one ought to behave at the time of another's loss and bereavement. The Talmud considers escorting the dead to their final resting place to be one of the most meritorious deeds an individual can perfor in his or her lifetime. It is referred to in Hebrew as *chesed shel emet*, "the ultimate kindness," for it is done out of pure motive, without the expectation of reward. Similarly, shiva--the seven-day period of mourning--although not directly mandated in the Bible, is nevertheless believed by the Rabbis to have the full force of biblical law. Visiting mourners during the week of shiva is a primary obligation of Jews. The Hebrew expression for comforting mourners is *nichum avelim*. How do we offer comfort? By our presence and by our words. The healing power of the spoken word is highlighted in a story that once made the rounds in Chasidic circles concerning the Magid ("Preacher") of Kosenitz, who had suffered the grievous loss of his wife. "When the preacher's most gifted disciple learned of his teacher's loss, he and two of his students came to the preacher's home to read Psalms and sing

Sabbath melodies to him and thereby soothe his pain. The three arrived and began their mission. With each word offered, the preacher grew stronger and stronger, and at the conclusion of shiva he rose and returned to his life. He praised his disciple and the students for allowing him to recover enough to complete his unfinished tasks on earth. The soft, moving words of the students had served as balm to the heartsick preacher. "

Not too long ago someone came up to me at one of our onegs and told me that she had been both surprised and deeply moved by the support and caring shown her by members of our congregation at the time that she had suffered a loss. I can tell you from personal experience that what may seem like a small gesture of comfort can take on enormous proportion to those who are grieving. All of us will be mourners; that is something we have no control over. But we **choose** to be comforters. Let us accept with gratitude what is offered to us when **we** are in need, and push ourselves just a little further to give the gift of our presence and our words to others when a loss falls on their home.



The Gifts of the Jews: How a Tribe of Desert Nomads Changed the Way Everyone Thinks and Feels




"If we had lived in the second millennium BC, the millennium of Abraham, and could have canvassed all the nations of the earth, what would they have said of Abraham's journey? In most of Africa and Europe, they would have laughed at Abraham's madness and pointed to the heavens, where the life of earth had been plotted from all eternity ... a man cannot escape his fate. The Egyptians would have shaken their heads in disbelief. The early Greeks might have told Abraham the story of Prometheus ... Do not overreach, they would advise; come to resignation. In India, he would be told that time is black, irrational and merciless. Do not set yourself the task of accomplishing something in time, which is only the dominion of suffering. On every continent, in every society, Abraham would have been given the same advice that wise men as diverse as Heraclitus, Lao-Tsu and Siddhartha would one day give their followers: do not journey but sit; compose yourself by the river of life, meditate on its ceaseless and meaningless flow."

Saving Israel: How the Jewish People Can Win A War That May Never End by Daniel Gordis

Attacked by terrorist, threatened by Arab states, and criticized by nearly everyone, Israel is the only country about which there is discussion as to whether it has a right to exist. Yet even its most ardent defenders cannot always articulate why Israel deserves to survive. In *Saving Israel*, Daniel Gordis admits that peace has never been farther off, but he also captures the wonder and vitality of this very special country, painting a picture if a nation well worth preserving. He provides a profound and persuasive argument, not just for how the Jewish homeland can survive, but how the enthusiasm so apparent at its founding can be cultivated today and for generations to come.

My opinion: 20th century history underscores the necessity for Israel's existence and coupled with the resurgence of anti-Semitism (in western Europe, intellectualized as anti Zionism) even in countries with a minimal Jewish population provides a powerful impetus for support for Israel. History should not be allowed to repeat itself.
