

Rabbi's Message

Dear friends,

For more than 50 years, the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism ("the RAC") has been the hub of Jewish social justice and legislative activity in Washington, D.C. As the DC office of the Union for Reform Judaism, the RAC educates and mobilizes the Reform Jewish community on legislative and social concerns, advocating on more than 70 different issues, including economic justice, civil rights, religious liberty, Israel and more. As a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, the RAC's advocacy work is completely non-partisan and pursues public policies that reflect the Jewish values of social justice that form the core of our mandate.

Passover is almost here. This spring the RAC suggests that Reform Jews consider adding racial justice themed readings to their seders and has provided several resources to aid this them. Here is one designed as a supplement to the Four Questions:

THE FOUR CHILDREN: A Racial Justice Haggadah Insert

The Wise Child asks: "What are the statutes and laws in our country that protect individuals from discrimination based on race?"

You should respond by referencing some of the most important pieces of legislation aimed at addressing racial injustice in the United States, including the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965. You should note that these laws were won through the efforts of individuals committed to social change, including many Reform Jews, and that the various protections they provide are critical to combating discrimination on the basis of race. At the same time, you should remind this child that the protections we already have are imperfect and, in many cases, are coming under attack. It is our responsibility as Reform Jews to fight against the erosion of existing civil rights laws and to advocate for reforms in education, criminal justice, voting rights and economic policies that advance true racial equality.

The Wicked Child asks: "Why must I be involved in pursuing racial justice?"

In asking this question, the wicked child has denied a basic principle of Judaism: that we have a collective responsibility to address injustice, even when we are not directly affected by that injustice or might benefit from it because of our own privilege. You should teach this child that it is for the sake of everyone that we advocate for racial justice. In protecting voting rights, improving access to education and calling for sensible criminal justice and law enforcement reforms, we affirm the fundamental Jewish belief that all people are created *b'tzelem Elohim*, in

the Divine image, and thus are deserving of equal rights.

The Simple Child asks: "What do we even mean by racial justice?"

You should tell this child that racial justice is the pursuit of equality for all people, regardless of race. You should further explain that racial injustice can take many forms, from explicitly racist comments to laws and institutions that perpetuate racial inequalities. With a firm hand, we as Reform Jews must protect every single person's civil rights, ensuring that no individual is excluded from the benefits of society or suffers under discriminatory laws and actions solely because of race or ethnicity. We must also consider the ways in which we are ourselves complicit in racial injustice and work to build communities and congregations that reflect our commitment to equality.

And the Child Who Does Not Know How to Ask:

To respond to the child who is too overwhelmed to ask a question, you should start at the beginning, telling the child that we are not required to complete the work of racial justice, but neither are we free to desist from it. There are many ways that we can play a positive role in the campaign for racial justice. We can help make racial justice issues a priority in our own synagogues by embracing Jewish racial diversity and by learning together about structural racism. We can build relationships across lines of faith and race. And we can initiate or participate in community, state and national efforts to advocate for civil rights laws. In all of these ways, we honor the legacy of our parents and grandparents – who in previous generations participated in acts of civil disobedience, marched arm-in-arm in support of equal rights for all Americans, and traveled to register voters – while at the same time ensuring that our children and future generations are granted an America in which our vision of racial justice is truly realized.

Passover Recipes from Dolly Weiss

CHOCOLATE TOFFEE MATZOS

Ingredients

- Enough sheets of matzo to cover the bottom of the pan. To cover the empty spaces just break up another piece of matzo to fill it in to cover the entire pan in a single layer.
- 1 cup butter
- 1 cup brown sugar (light or dark, no difference)
- 12 14 ounces of semi-sweet chocolate chips
- One cup toffee candy pieces (in baking section of supermarket)

Instructions

Pre-heat oven to 450°

Line a jelly roll pan (15" x 10") with aluminum foil following first ingredient instruction.

- Melt butter and brown sugar in saucepan. Bring to a full boil and boil about 4-5 minutes, stirring occasionally and not too high a flame ... just high enough to keep it boiling.
- Pour mixture over matzo and spread evenly and as quickly as possible with a spatula. It might "pool" in places if the matzoh is uneven. Just try to cover all the matzoh and don't worry too much about it. The next step should even it out.
- Bake at 450° for four minutes; remove from oven (do not shut oven off)
- Sprinkle chocolate chips on top and put back in the oven for one minute.
- Remove from oven and carefully spread melted chocolate to cover as completely as possible. Sprinkle with toffee candy.
- Cool completely. Refrigerate cooled candy until VERY cold. Once very cold, break into pieces and store in a covered container in the refrigerator.

PASSOVER AWESOME BROWNIES

Ingredients

4 eggs
2 cups white sugar
1 cup unsalted butter, melted
6 TBS matzo cake meal
1 cup cocoa powder (Ghiardelli is best)
1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans (OPTIONAL)

**FROSTING

4 oz. Semi-sweet chocolate melted (either squares or chocolate chips)

1 TBS Crisco® melted

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350°. Line with aluminum foil and grease a 9" x 9" inch* baking pan. In a medium size mixing bowl, blend eggs, sugar and butter. Mix in matzo meal, cocoa powder and nuts. Transfer batter to prepared baking pan. Bake for 35 minutes.* For frosting, blend chocolate and Crisco® in microwaveable dish, slowly, until melted. Spread over COOLED brownies.

*If you use an 8 x 8 pan it may seem to be very jiggly after 30 minutes. If it's VERY jiggly and a toothpick inserted in center is VERY wet, return to oven for about 5 minutes. It will still look not completely cooked, but it is and will set up nicely. You don't want to overcook these brownies.

** You can use the above recipe for a frosting on the completely cooled brownies OR you can use Duncan Hines icing and decorate each individual cut brownie. I use the vanilla and it tastes and looks great. **ALSO** it looks great to simply dust the brownies with confectioner's sugar AFTER they've been cut

NOTE: Brownies should be cooled before cutting into 2" pieces (2x2)

"A trip to Savannah"...travel recommendation from Phil Miller

If you ever happen to be in Savannah Georgia, take the time to visit a fellow reform temple, Congregation Mickve Israel. Founded by a group of settlers arriving here London in 1733, it is the third synagogue established in America, and the first in a southern colony. The group included eight Ashkenazim, and thirty-four Sephardim who had escaped from the Inquisition in Portugal.

The current sanctuary dates back to 1876, and is a rare American synagogue built in the Victorian era neo-Gothic style.

While at the synagogue, be sure to see the valuable relics, including a torah scroll brought by the Jewish settlers in 1733, which dates from the 1400s and is one of the oldest torah scrolls in America. Also, the ark contains a torah brought from Czechoslovakia, saved from the Nazis during World War Two.

Tours are available every weekday.

Community Announcements

The following article was sent to me by New Jersey Organizing Project (NJOP) which was formed following Super Storm Sandy to advocate for those who were displaced by the storm and who are still displaced and trying to get back home, or who are home and are still fighting to recover.

Dear Helen,

Yesterday [Monday April 11] we attended a hearing in Trenton about the budget and spending for Sandy recovery efforts. We weren't allowed to ask questions directly to the Department of Community Affairs but we made our presence known by wearing shirts with serious but slightly humorous sayings like, "If Sandy didn't kill you the RREM program might" and "Ask me what I'd do with \$1.1 billion in Sandy relief funds."

It's our sense of humor that has helped us get through the past three and a half years. However, there is nothing humorous about families scrounging for every dollar to rebuild only to find out the DCA is using up to 5% of recovery funding to cover their own staff and administrative costs. I guess the joke is on us that 3 1/2 years later only 32% of the families in RREM are home.

Sign this petition to tell the DCA: Show us the money and the progress.
