I hope that you are enjoying these final days of summer and that the last few months have been restful and restorative for you and your loved ones.

I write today with the High Holy Days very much on my mind as I am deeply immersed in preparation—practical and spiritual. Both practically and spiritually speaking, my peerless partner, Philip Altland, and I have already had two long, in-person planning meetings in which we have reviewed all of our services. Always, our most important goal is the creation of worship experiences that engage your head, heart and soul. This is not as easy as it might seem; if you have been to even one of our services then you know that we go far beyond simply reading our way straight through the service. There are many challenges, just a few of which are the balance of Hebrew and English, the musical selections, the placement of supplemental material, and the integration of lay readers and speakers. No one service could possibly ever be the "perfect" service for every worshiper. So we try to make sure that there is, at least, something for everyone, and we ask for your patience and understanding of our challenge. If our services feel seamless (and I hope they do), that is only because of the great deal of thinking and planning that underlie them. Philip and I constantly look for ways to weave together music, liturgy, and secular poetry and prose into an experience that is not only beautiful but also prods us to grow into fuller, deeper, richer versions of ourselves. That is, after all, the point of these Days of Awe.

No discussion of these holidays would be complete with mentioning the melodious gifts of Stan Jackson whose soulful playing of clarinet and flute makes our music soar and for which I am immensely grateful.

In addition to myself, members of our community will speak during this year's services: our President, Phil Miller, on erev Rosh Hashanah, and Hope Gardiner and Rhona Levy on Yom Kippur afternoon. Philip will also give an explanation about the special melodies used only on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Also, as I did last year, I will invite you to bring what I call "an object of memory" with you to our Yizkor service to put into the ark. Finally, as we have done in the past, I will invite all who wish to come up to the ark for a private moment during the concluding, Neilah, service.

I so look forward to sharing these awe-filled days with you. Until then,

One of my duties as Temple President is to address our Congregation during the High Holy Days. As many of you having belonged to other synagogues in the past are aware, it is traditional to have a Yom Kippur appeal, wherein the President asks for money on that holiest of days. But we cannot thrive as an "ala carte" institution, where we pay for items we need. We all want our Temple to be more than that. We are here to offer a sense of community, and this community needs financial assistance to survive, now more than ever. Our dues simply do not meet our expenses.

We strive continuously to increase our membership, and I am confident we will grow our numbers. But for now we have only each other. Please be as generous as you can this time of year so that our community can exist now and hopefully well into the future.

A Relational Judaism by Ron Wolfson

The art of welcoming rests on a central Jewish idea: every human being is created in the image of God. When we see each other as an embodiment of Godliness, welcoming someone becomes an act of profound spirituality. Welcoming is the first step in building a relationship with another. So when I see someone walk into a worship service or JCC, I have a choice to make. I can ignore the person or I can initiate a conversation with a simple greeting of welcome. Without that crucial move there is no possibility of relationship.

Abraham and Sarah practiced the art of welcoming strangers. In parashat Vayeira Abraham is sitting at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day, convalescing, when three strangers appear. The instant Abraham sees them he runs to welcome them, calls to Sarah and his servant to bring water and food and fulfills their needs.

Rav Dimi of Nehardea said: Hachnasat orchim - the welcoming of guests - takes precedence over the beit midrash - the house of study.

Rav Judah said in Rav's name: Hachnasat orchim - the welcoming of guests - takes precedence over welcoming the shechina, the divine presence of God herself. (Shabbat 127a)

If we are to create Jewish institutions of relationships, we all must continually work on improving our ability to welcome others. It will not be enough to only have greeters at the front doors of our buildings. The upcoming High Holy Day period is our annual family reunion, the largest gathering of our people. This year, after greeting family and friends, spend three minutes welcoming someone you don't know. If we all did it, we would change the culture of our community from transactional to relational, from cold and aloof to warm and welcoming. Tap into the Godliness within you and connect to the Godliness in others.

Holiday Greetings

Gut Yontiff (GUT YAHN-tiff; gut rhymes with put) Yiddish. Literally, good holiday. This greeting can be used for any holiday, not L'Shanah Tovah (li-SHAH-nuh TOH-vuh; li-shah-NAH toh-VAH) Hebrew. Lit. for a good year. A common greeting during Rosh Hashanah and Days of Awe. It is an abbreviation of L'shanah tovah tikatev v'taihatem (May you be inscribed and sealed for a good year). Chag Sameach (KHAHG sah-MEHY-ahkh) Hebrew. Literally, joyous festival. This is an appropriate greeting for just about any holiday, but it's especially appropriate for Sukkot, Shavu'ot and Pesach (Passover), which are technically the only festivals (the other holidays are holidays, not festivals). Have an easy fast This is the proper way to wish someone well for Yom Kippur. Please, don't wish people a Happy Yom Kippur; it's not a happy holiday.

One God Clapping by Alan Lew

From Zen Buddhist practitioner to rabbi, East meets West in this firsthand account of a spiritual journey. Rabbi Alan Lew is known as the Zen Rabbi, a leader in the Jewish meditation movement who works to bring two ancient religious traditions into our everyday lives. One God Clapping is the story of his roundabout yet continuously provoking spiritual odyssey. It is also the story of the meeting between East and West in America, and the ways in which the encounter has transformed how all of us understand God and ourselves.

Winner of the PEN / Joseph E. Miles Award Like a Zen parable or a Jewish folk tale, One God Clapping unfolds as a series of stories, each containing a moment of revelation or instruction that, while often unexpected, is never simple or contrived. One God Clapping, like the life of the remarkable Alan Lew himself, is a bold experiment in the integration of Eastern and Western ways of looking at and living in the world. Alan Lew was the rabbi of Congregation Beth Sholom in San Francisco and who was at the forefront of the movement to develop new forms of Jewish spiritual expression. His work in the area of using Zen meditation to enhance Jewish spirituality has been highlighted on programs such as ABC News, The MacNeil-Lehrer Report, the PBS news magazine Religion and Ethics Newsweekly, and National Public Radio's All Things Considered..

Sherril Jaffe is the author of many books, including Ground Rules and House Tours. Jaffe is a professor of English at Sonoma State University where she teaches fiction writing. Sherril widow of Allan lives with their family in San Francisco.
