

MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI DECEMBER 2015

Dear friends,

The Million Mom March was held on Mother's Day, May 14, 2000 in the Washington D.C. National Mall in order to promote effective gun safety laws. The march drew an estimated attendance of 750,000 people at the D.C. location, and with 150,000 to 200,000 people holding satellite events in more than 70 cities across the country, the total number of participants was about one million.

The Million Mom March began as a grassroots movement sparked by Donna Dees-Thomases after she viewed broadcast coverage of the Jewish Community Center shooting in Granada Hills, California in August of 1999. In that event, white supremacist, Buford O. Furrow, Jr. walked into the lobby of the North Valley Jewish Community Center and opened fire with a semiautomatic weapon, firing 70 shots into the complex. The attack killed one person and wounded five people including three children, one of whom barely survived.

I attended the Million Mom March. Among the many speakers at the rally was Rabbi Eric Yoffie, then President of the Union for Reform Judaism. He was the only clergy member among the speakers. I remember how profoundly proud those around me and I were listening to him, knowing that he represented *us* – Jews and, especially, Reform Jews. Rabbi' Yoffie's words and his passionate delivery that day were prophetic in nature. Tragically, Rabbi Yoffie's speech more than 15 years ago is as relevant today as it was the day he delivered it. "Is the need for sensible gun-control a religious issue? You bet it is.

The indiscriminate distribution of guns is an offense against God and humanity. Controlling guns is not only a political matter, it is a solemn religious obligation. Our gun-flooded society has turned weapons into idols, and the worship of idols must be recognized for what it is-blasphemy. And the only appropriate religious response to blasphemy is sustained moral outrage. Our legislators and the gun lobby want to blame everyone but themselves. The problem, they say, is media violence: violent action films, gory horror flicks, violent computer games. And this is a deeply troubling problem. There is far too much violent entertainment, and it is very bad for

more religious than our children, and their parents are not better parents than we are. What distinguishes us from them is the prevalence of our guns, and the cowardliness of our politicians.

Teaching teenagers to curb their angry impulses is a challenge for every parent and religious leader on the planet. But of all the developed countries, only in America is it possible for a disturbed teenager to get his

But are we proud of the fact that our murder rate is 12 times higher than any advanced country?

Are we proud of the fact that too many members of Congress pontificate on morality and then do nothing while the carnage continues in our streets and our homes?

Are we proud of the fact that there are too many handguns in too many trigger-happy hands, while politicians remains deaf to the frightened cries of children?

Are we proud of the fact that the House and Senate are awash in NRA cash, while the voice of the average American gets lost in the halls of Congress?

And so let's send a message today to those who represent us in Washington. And the message is this:

We care deeply about this issue and we will hold you accountable.

We are ready for a knock-down, drag-out, no-holds-barred battle against the NRA, which is the real criminals' lobby in this country, and which is drenched in the blood of murdered children.

True, we may not have the money of the NRA, but we've got savvy, grit, and passion. And we're going to find out who's getting NRA funds, and benefiting from NRA ads, and we're going to vote for the other guy.

Until now, our moral outrage has been too feeble and our sense of injustice too timid, but we look at the mothers of the murdered and the maimed, and we say: Enough. I for one am filled with a fresh spirit of hope.

Yes, all of this may seem daunting, but the tobacco lobbyists once seemed invincible, and look what happened to them.

The American people, I believe, are ready for a leader who will take on the fanatics and support sensible gun control.

We are not prisoners of our past. We are not doomed to relive history.

We are here today, in such great numbers, because we are, all of us, partners with God in shaping a better and more hopeful future for all of God's children."

A book review from Rosalie Donadio.....

The Marriage of Opposites (by Alice Hoffman, author of The Dovekeepers)

Hoffman presents (in her novels) portraits of powerful, passionate women who stand up to and overcome difficult circumstance. She weaves her story (based upon carefully researched fact) into a tapestry of emotion ... her words are dreamlike propelling you into another time. And she is very much a "Jewish" writer.

In "The Marriage of Opposites," Hoffman turns to actual historical figures, namely Rachel Pomie Petit Pizzarro and her son, the artist Camille Pissarro (the father of impressionism). The family are descendants of Iberia's *Marranos* transported to the island of St. Thomas and are Danish citizens (an enlightened country granting Jewish residents the privilege of citizen since the 18th century).

Each component of this tale is first person (all of the principals are presented). Plot is one challenge of writing fiction about real people, and the stories of Rachel and Camille unfold more as chronicle than narrative. Rachel's parents marry her off to an older widower with three children; she has three more children, and her husband dies. She then falls scandalously in love with her husband's nephew, with whom she has a disputed (by Jewish law) marriage and more children, including Camille, her youngest, before battling her way back to respectability. Over the course of these events, Rachel evolves from rebel to oppressor, as the novel's conflicts and relationships repeat themselves across new generations.

Hoffman beautifully evokes the tropical lushness of St. Thomas and the emergence of Camille's artistic career. Her descriptions are akin to the paintings of Pissaro (French spelling of the family name of Pizzaro). It is almost always a surprise to Ashkenazim of the existence of names such as Pizzaro, Cardozo, Modigliani, Caro, Montefiore (all "Jewish" names); these are very common among Sefardim. And there are even Ashkenazic names such as Peretz (Perez) and Bailen, among many, which emanated from Spain/Portugal. But this is a Sephardic Jewish tale who cognizance of their heritage defines them in a very particular way.

I visited St. Thomas some years ago and visited the birthplace (now a travel agency and art gallery) the birthplace of Pissaro (whose work I enjoy) in Charlotte Amalie...even the synagogue where his family worshipped. It was unlike anything I had seen; the entire floor was covered with sand and there was the ubiquitous section for the women. It would have been more meaningful to me had I been aware of the familial dynamics that helped create Pissaro's genius. He brought the revelation of light and color from St. Thomas to Paris with him.

I enjoyed this book (as I did The Dove Keepers). Hoffman is a great storyteller and you become educated despite yourself.

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
